

Punctuation Tips for Compound Sentences

A compound sentence is a sentence that contains two or more independent clauses. The independent clauses must be joined by one of the methods below to form one sentence. Remember: An independent clause must have a subject and a verb and be able to stand alone as a simple sentence.

Independent clauses

Bobby returned the watch to the store.

(***Bobby*** is the subject, and ***returned*** is the verb.)

The clerk refunded his money.

(***Clerk*** is the subject, and ***refunded*** is the verb.)

A compound sentence can be created by joining the two independent clauses with a comma and one of the coordinating conjunctions (FANBOYS).

Example:

Bobby returned the watch to the store, so the clerk refunded his money.

A compound sentence can be created by joining the two independent clauses with a semicolon.

NOTE: Do not capitalize the first word of the independent clause following the semicolon.

Independent clause	; semicolon	independent clause
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Example:

Bobby returned the watch to the store; the clerk refunded his money.

Bobby returned the watch to the store; the clerk, therefore, returned his money.

A compound sentence can be created by joining the two independent clauses with a semicolon, a conjunctive adverb, and a comma.

Independent clause	; conjunctive adverb,	independent clause
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Example:

Bobby returned the watch to the store; therefore, the clerk returned his money.
