Adjectives: Comparative and Superlative Degree

The comparative degree is used when two elements are compared. The superlative degree is used when more than two elements are compared.

General guidelines for forming the comparative and superlative degree are:

| | Comparative (Comparing 2) | Superlative (Comparing 3 or more) |
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| For one-syllable words | Add - <i>er</i> | Add - <i>est</i> |
| For many two-syllable words* | Add - <i>er</i> or - <i>ier</i> | Add - <i>est</i> or - <i>iest</i> |
| For other two-syllable or longer words* | Use <i>more</i> or <i>less</i> | Use <i>most</i> or <i>least</i> |
| Tricky comparatives/ superlatives: good bad | better worse | best worst |

The Rules for Using Comparative/Superlative Adjectives

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| <p>-er/-est is added to the end of a 1-syllable adjective</p> | <p>cold – colder – coldest</p> <p>small – smaller – smallest</p> <p>tall – taller - tallest</p> | <p>The winter is colder than the summer. Winter is the coldest season.</p> <p>The green hat is smaller than the yellow hat. The green hat is my smallest hat.</p> <p>Most basketball players are taller than I. They are also the tallest students in our school.</p> |
| <p>-er /-est is added to the end of an adjective with 2 syllables IF the word ends in -y (Adjectives that end in -y change the -y to i and add –er /est.)</p> | <p>early – earlier – earliest</p> <p>happy – happier - happiest</p> <p>crazy – crazier - craziest</p> | <p>I came home earlier than my sister. The earliest I can be there is Tuesday.</p> <p>I am happier now than I was one year ago. Yesterday was the happiest day of my life.</p> <p>My friend is crazier than I, but my brother is the craziest of all.</p> |
| <p>"more" / "most" is used for words that have 2 syllables IF the word doesn't end in -y</p> | <p>honest more honest most honest</p> <p>difficult more difficult most difficult</p> <p>modern more modern most modern</p> | <p>Policemen are more honest than criminals. Lincoln was our most honest President.</p> <p>The last test was more difficult than the test today. My algebra test was the most difficult I have had.</p> <p>Our generation is more modern than our parents' generation. His ideas are the most modern of all my teachers.</p> |
| <p>"more" / "most" is used for words that have 3 or more syllables</p> | <p>expensive more expensive most expensive</p> <p>difficult more difficult most difficult</p> <p>comfortable more comfortable most comfortable</p> | <p>Her ring is more expensive than mine. Jane's house is the most expensive on the block.</p> <p>It is more difficult to bake a cake than roast a turkey. Skiing is the most difficult sport.</p> <p>This chair is more comfortable than that one. This is the most comfortable bed in the house.</p> |
| <p>adjectives that end in –e: only –r/-st is added to the end of the adjective</p> | <p>nice – nicer - nicest</p> <p>safe – safer - safest</p> | <p>This material is nicer than the one I selected. She is the nicest teacher I have.</p> <p>The turnpike is safer than I-95. Airplane travel is the safest way to go.</p> |

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| adjectives that end in a consonant-vowel-consonant: the last consonant is doubled | big – bigger – biggest | My house is bigger than my sister's house. That is the biggest city I have ever visited. |
| | fat – fatter - fattest | My sister is fatter than I am. The fattest cat I saw weighed twenty-two pounds. |
| | hot – hotter - hottest | This summer is hotter than last summer. This is the hottest day yet. |
